### PROGRAM: DIGITAL CAMERAS FOR NATURE PHOTOGRAPHERS

Wisconsin's diverse natural resources are among the most important quality of life issues for many residents. It has become a favorite pastime for many people to photograph the animals, plants, lakes, streams, etc. to share with family and friends.

Digital cameras may not be for everyone (yet), but they offer some interesting opportunities for people who enjoy nature photography. It can fundamentally change the practice of taking photos by allowing the user to take many more images than would otherwise be practical and then choosing only the best to keep. This is particularly useful for photographing things which jump, fly, scurry or blow in the wind. (As many natural subjects do!) Images can be viewed immediately so you know if the subject is actually visible in the picture or whether the exposure was wrong, or if your thumb was over the lens! You can delete unwanted pictures or crop the image to eliminate unwanted aspects. The images can be immediately printed or better still not printed at all, but quickly sent with an e-mail message to share with others. (This also applies to baby pictures!)

Gary Fewless of UW-Green Bay's Cofrin Arboretum Center for Biodiversity will discuss the basics of digital photography, including advantages and disadvantages, and will demonstrate some of the possibilities for editing your photos on your home computer.
